Half awake and hungry, I grab my iPad and a charger to import my photos and edit them online

9:30 am

I fish out a pen from the bottom of my bag to take notes and discuss parenting styles with my group from childhood until all the way grown
We go to lunch and come back only to continue our conversation on mental health
Nervous to talk to the people in my group and scared of getting the wrong answer, I sat there wishing I was able to do it alone

11:27 am

I go into the locker room and change into proper clothes and sneakers for the dreaded pacer test

I stretch my legs nervously and am disappointed to find out that I did worse this time around that the last

Walking back to the locker room, I am annoyed that I now have to go home with sore muscles and shortness of breath

Not realizing that the second I left the building, I had no idea if or when I would return. Not realizing that the reality of a global pandemic would soon consume everyone's daily lives. Not realizing that there are people in hospitals who are falling asleep and not waking up, not realizing that people in crowded settings are contracting this virus and are now fighting for their lives, not realizing that people's mental health are deteriorating and depend on support lines as their only company, not realizing that people with shortness of breath today could easily be another number in a death toll tomorrow. This pandemic has taught me many lessons and not ones of how to navigate through a chaotic grocery store or manage online classes, but one that will forever stick with me: life itself is a precious thing that we should never take for granted. Live in the moment because we never know when it will be our last.

MY QUARANTINE EXPERIENCE

Before the pandemic hit, I was your average 15 year old girl who went to school, loved spending time with her friends, and stressed out over assignments. Now, I'm a 16 year old who has grown to obsess over news updates, gets out of the house by going on walks, and looks forward to the next time where I'll be able to see my family. My quarantine experience has been similar to many: lonely, boring, and repetitive. Although I have never lived through anything like this before, this whole pandemic has made me treasure a lot of the little moments in life.

I picked up new hobbies and I've been trying to learn more skills to pass by the time at home. I've been practicing photography, going on sunset walks around my neighborhood, and learned to navigate through zoom calls to keep in touch with people. I started digital art which is something I now love and even vlogged my last week of online school so I can in the future, I can remember what this pandemic was like. I've learned to venture out of my comfort zone by trying new things, but always find myself returning to the things I've always adored as well like baking and fitness. I've had painting sessions with my sister and found myself trying to be as creative as possible during this quarantine.

Even though I was upset, I've learned to appreciate beautiful sunsets and family time and in general-life.

Some of my family members have actually died because of the coronavirus and others I know are still fighting it. Some of my family members are working the front lines at hospitals and are essential workers at places like the post office. And then there are also people like me. People who are simply observing the crazy world right now and writing it all out for you to somehow comprehend, although I can't seem to comprehend it myself.

I've always loved how photographs are able to capture moments of life along with the emotions of people. I hope more than anything, that this little entry served as a snapshot, or photograph, of my life right now. I hope that you were able to see that even though there was a negative situation, that I tried to make the best of it, and even though there has been losses to life, I have grown to be so appreciative of life as well. Coronavirus, you were definitely one for the books.

April 13, 2020

Like many of you reading this post, I have cobbled together a stay-at-home routine, the loose-leaf kind - plenty of pages, easily reordered. Thanks to a call from my daughter early on in the COVID-19 crisis, I was able to secure a supply of elastic, pull fabric from storage tubs, grab additional yardage from the thinning shelves at a local store and begin to sew and donate masks to St. Peter's Hospital and other essential workers. Three layers, two pleats and washable, handmade face coverings have become the everyman's PPE -- hiding smiles and dimples and the nose I never liked.

I find sewing cathartic. Sitting in my mother's old chair, leaning into the shadows cast by the machine's carriage light, the click of its needle pierces the fabric and secures elastic for unknown ears. There is the steady whirl of the washer and dryer sloshing and tossing fabric for a next batch of masks while an unattended flat screen provides a soundtrack of body counts, hotspots and *would've*, *should've*, *could'ves*. It is a weird time, a sad time, a time my mother would have dubbed "a test of faith." My father would have advised us all to "pull together and just work through it." They were hardworking, loving and tough. Wars, the Great Depression and poor health had shaped them into the most resilient, persevering, faith-filled parents that a now grown daughter could have ever hoped for. And, during a time like this, we all need hope.

I grew up on a small truck farm in rural Pennsylvania where a sewing machine was a must. Resources were modest, bartered or simply shared. Farm life may sound utopic, but really it is a difficult and precarious dance with Mother Nature as this pandemic affirms daily. Drought, blight, floods, disease, you name it and farmers have had to endure -- finding work arounds, banding together and at times, going out of business.

Fall meant harvesting the crops, freezing and canning and bedding the farm down for winter. It was also back-to-school and a much anticipated trip to the Old Trail Fabric Store for a few new McCall's patterns,

material and notions. Our clothes were mostly home sewn or hand-medowns in good repair, nipped and tucked to fit the next in line.

My mother, Emma, was a talented, expert seamstress -- anal by today's standards, matching even the finest of plaids regardless of a zipper lap or sleeve cuff. She had worked in a dress factory in Northumberland, Pennsylvania that cut and sewed L'Aiglon dresses, a line of women's clothing catapulted by the Post WWII economic boom of the 1950s and women's desire for runway fashions on modest budgets. There was no room for sloppy sewing; jobs were important and coveted. One employee perk was access to scraps of fabric or bolt 'ends' that employees could sort through and take home for personal sewing projects. Until the day we sold the farm in the late 90s, the attic was filled with boxes of fabric she had gathered over the years and used to skillfully piece together hundreds of clothing items for family and friends, perfectly matched and beautifully sewn.

But, her attention to detail was most likely honed much earlier. During World War II, she worked in a retrofitted Westinghouse Electric factory where she tested battleship and submarine panels for the United States Navy. You may remember J. Howard Miller's iconic, "We Can Do It" poster created for the company and designed to spur on the thousands of women, manning the factories, to work harder for our boys -- their boys, fighting abroad. She was part of that female fueled workforce, tirelessly working long hours, on and off the clock, to ensure that each and every panel operated perfectly. Perfection was not just a standard, it was a must. "Our boys' lives depended on it," I vividly remember her saying. Whenever she spoke of that time in her life, I think her 4'11" stature swelled at least an inch with the pride she felt in her contribution. So, what does all of this have to do with the day? Today would have been my mother's 97th birthday – a Friday in 1923. She always regarded Friday the 13th as a lucky day, her lucky day. Today, April 13th begins another week of sheltering in place and flattening the curve. Although I am certain my sewing does not meet her standards, I am sure she is looking down from above, approving the effort. Happy birthday, Mom!

I work in Monroe Township and I tested positive for Covid-19. This is my experience:

April 18, 2020

At first I, like many people, did not take the virus seriously. As time went on I started to watch more and read more. I wanted to try and educate myself on this killer virus. As more time went by it all became very frightening to me. As directed I began staying home and I did social distancing as much as I could. My mother is 80 years old and lives alone. She has health issues and I feared for her because I am an only child.

I started to get sick in the beggining of April. I thought it was the flu. I thought there was no way I had COVID-19. Still, I went to get tested and quarantined myself. It took over a week but I got the call," you are POSITIVE for the corona virus". I cried. My life changed. Two weeks I spent alone, sick and scared. I have two married sons and three grankids who all called twice a day and continue to call everyday even though I have recovered. My poor mom was worried sick too. All I could do was just pray that I would be okay and that she would be okay. I was so sisck. I thank God I did not have to go to the hospital. I will forever be grateful for my husband, family, and friends for their caring words and constant calls to make sure I was ok. I recovered.

My life after COVID-19 will definitely be different. I will love and appreciate the simple pleasures life has to offer. I will not take so much for granted again. The highlight of my day are still the calls everyday from my sons, my grankids, friends, and family. I hope even when things go back to normal they continue. I hope everyone stays safe and healthy xx

I am totally humbled by all the Birthday wishes this year!!

It's been a different type of "Birthday experience" being quarantined with family...

Grocery shopping online for my own cake mix and frosting and even after waiting two weeks for

my order to come; I recieved only 1 can of frosting and no cake mix Cheese cake came to the rescue!!!



I also had a few bananas hat my friend Hitesh Patel had suggested adding a candle to it and blowing.




"44" has never felt so good...

Andrea Berke's Pandemic 2020 Diary

Most people call me Andy. I was born in 1941 in Philadelphia, and my husband & I have lived at the Encore community since its very beginning in 2002. We are retired. I worked at a central NJ High School over 30 years, retiring in 2000. My husband retired in November 2001, shortly after 9/11 which he witnessed from his office.

Our retired lives thru the beginning of March were very full. Jerry played the trumpet in three local bands, golfed, bowled, entertained as a lecturer/performer at local venues. I was active in a few not for profits, played cards ,belonged to two book groups & a discussion group, led discussion groups, participated in Encore community activities as the retired do. We went into the city & dined out often, visited friends & family.

We traveled extensively and just returned from a winter road trip which included a Caribbean cruise on a mega ship in late February, RT from Fort Lauderdale.

We arrived home March 5 and shortly thereafter, life as we knew it ended. This is the 120 day diary I wrote March 21 through July 30. Many of us think of it as Ground Hog Day as most days are pretty much the same. Sometimes only the diary helps me with what day of the week it actually is.

We have been fortunate on the face of it. No one in our immediate family has contacted the virus. We live in our own home and have not been affected economically.

We are overwhelmed by the political & social divisiveness and are aghast over the weakness and irresponsibility of our national leadership. I taught history for many years and never imagined the future of the republic could ever be in danger. This having marched protesting the Viet Nam War, teaching in an urban high school, surrounded by the National Guard following racial unrest. And, of course, 9/11.

And now, for all practical purpose, we are confined to our homes -except for occasional forays & video conferences-watching this catastrophe which is the

summer of 2020. unfold. And there is no guarantee that we will ever return to any semblance of the lives we led.

Day 1: March 21, 2020

Shirley Santos, the Encore community manager suggested in a post that we keep a daily diary

during this lock-down period. So here goes. First case detected March 4.

It's early so haven't done much today other than be freaked out by the crisis in the Manhattan hospital ER's. Nj started drive-up testing in Paramus yesterday, ran out quickly. TV ran negative reports about it.

Also enjoyed neighbor Jeff Elkin's hilarious tour of Encore vis-a vis community e-mail.

We had great personal success yesterday. Found TP at Stop & Shop...and Jerry vacuumed. Neighbors are walking, but I think they are too close when stopping to chat. I went over to Gita & Ed's patio and visited-staying 6 feet apart. She asked what we are doing to keep busy.

Somehow we are filling up the time.

Started a Hot Topics e-mail stream. Lots of venting! Made a list and called everyone on it. You can hear the birds early each morning drowning out the roar from the Turnpike...Trees are about three days from full bloom.

March 22

Yesterday we learned to use Zoom. Connected Dave and we had a great video visit for @ 30 minutes. Doris Kastan called and we chatted. She is almost a prisoner in her assisted living facility in Alexandria. No visitors, meals in her apartment, temperature check if she goes outside

Texted Geri who is still in rehab. Also eating all her meals in her room.

Played Sequence for the second night in a row. Have to get Jerry to play more than one round. We are even in in games won. He went on You Tube and escaped into his world of music documentaries and practiced his trumpet. I watched Madame Walked mini-series on Netflix, but it bored me as did Second Chance with JLo. Finished Sophie Kinsella lighter than light novel. Checked out Facebook, e-mailed Sy Marsh-sad story with his wife Lynn, spoke to Sheila and they're doing well-even taking an art class on Zoom. Made delicious pizza using cauliflower crust for dinner! The mail is much lighter.

The kids are all ok. Maybe we should all set up a Zoom meeting! Sent a contribution to Joe Biden's campaign. Andrew Cuomo is emerging as a true leader as is our Governor Murphy.

March 23

Lots of phone calls today. Dave seemed in better spirits, Emma drove to the supermarket on a pork chop run to Candy's with her Dad, Shelley is in the midst of selling & buying house. The selling is not going smoothly, Marylynn & Bernice have postponed return North

indefinitely. We had Nathan's pigs in blankets for dinner & played Sequence & Jerry is now in the lead. Watched Spenser at Diana's rec. Nice escapist violent entertainment. The hero, Mark Wahlburger looked fit, but got beat up a lot. Boston is very realistic looking in this. This is two for two where Jerry & I spent the whole evening doing something together-a game and a movie! The Gursky's told us about ordering from Shop-Rite on line with curbside pick-up. Will try tomorrow Sherry & Elliot are freed from self-isolation and can now walk in the neighborhood and get take-out. They got Margaritas to go-I'm jealous.

March 24

Listened/watched Kelly & Ryan. Must be difficult skyping from your kitchen for an hour chatting about nothing. Savannah& Hoda are also chatting. It must be some kind of company for those alone.

BNC Exec board Zoomed yesterday for @ an hour. Cancelled all programs thru May. Went thru the list and decided who gets refunds and who gets credit. Lots of work for Eleanor & Dian.

The next meeting will be on an as needed basis. We will postpone developing the Summer/Fall Bulletin

once we have a handle on when people get back to work.

Tried to order groceries for curbside pick-up. Shop-Rite is booked for the next 10 days and is not taking further reservations. Stop & Shop canceled its store pick-up.

Tried to get some interest in on-line live canasta. Flamed out of that one. We played Sequence after dinner.

The Olympics are postponed for one year. The President wants to get the nation back to work sooner rather than later. Congress is still dithering about the bailout bill. It should get to the Prez today.

Turns out the President loves his daily turns at briefings and loves being President. But the messages he sends are confusing and change with the wind.

March 25

The Congressional Bill is ready to be voted on & passed. Two trillion dollars. Andrew Cuomo has become the must see briefing of the day. Terrific job. Watched a history lecture zoomed by the library.

This Is Us was really god last night. Season finale. We skipped Sequence last night. Gabi suggested we "happy hour" at 4 ish this afternoon. President predicted massive suicides if we don't get the economy working-he wants crowded churches on Easter Sunday. Spoke to David. He & his neighbors seem to be walking...more than here. We had lunch on the patio..cool but nice warm sun.

March 26

Watching Kelly & Ryan. Interesting point- the importance of giving the day and the date as it's so easy to lose track. Happy Hour didn't happen yesterday. Gabi had to go to Shop-Rite to pick up her on-line order. Long lines!!!!! Rescheduled for Friday. Misunderstood her. She meant long wait to get reservation for order.

The Rescue bill passed the Senate last night, waiting for the House & the Prez. Hopefully will help the growing throngs of unemployed. It rained all day, but tomorrow we plan to walk. We are no longer watching TV after 11

And I've weaned off a lot of the news shows...

Big event! Washed the floors-first time in 17 years. Not so bad..and we put Sirius on hold for 6 months.

Spoke to Naomi & Henry last night. They had to cancel their Passover get together. Henry told a funny story. In a search for retired doctors they found him and reached out to him. Turns out there is another retired Dr. Henry Cherrick, but he's in his 60's. But they called at 3 AM. They still support the President, and Naomi can't stand Cuomo. Dr.Fasci was on wth Chris Cuomo. He is obviously close to the family and convinced Chris to send his family away from him because of his contact with the public.

March 27

Actually got take-out last night -sandwiches for D&T. Several of us sat in Linda's driveway yesterday

widely apart and chatted mostly about the frustrations of shopping. Sondra and Shirley are trying to instigate a 1 PM neighbor greeting, I was it on Daisy Court,. But I think it will pick up. The Temple will zoom services tonight again.

Spoke to Marylynn last night. Turns out there is now a shortage of her Lupus medication as they are trying to use it for the virus. She has two months supply.

The President's attitude is so detrimental to the welfare of this country. Totally undermining the security of this country.

Tentatively will "happy hour" with Gabi later today.

Not calling around as much as we were in the beginning.

Saturday, March 28

We were invited to a Zoom Meeting with Dave, Barry & Debbie, It was fun. Decided not to go to a supermarket. The numbers of cases & deaths rose precipitously. Input my up-dated Hot Topics

e-mail list and sent inquiry if they want to try a Zoom Meeting on Monday. One new member asked to be removed from the invitation list.

Went for a walk around 1 PM. Did the whole circle (1&1/4 miles) Greeted several neighbors. It was nice.

Happy Houred with Gabi. Micheal is chafing under the in place regulations.

She is driving herself crazy.

The President signed the Rescue Bill-\$2 trillion and signed an emergency order enacting the National Emergency Act which empowers him to direct industries to manufacture needed materials.

He leads these briefings with inaccurate information and totally confuses everyone. Had he taken these actions two or three weeks ago the materials might be in place instead of in the pipeline for delivery whenever. The virus is sweeping the country and no one knows how many people have it. There appears to be a second wave in China. People are coming out of retirement to assist..and the President

appears to be astounded that ordinary citizens are stepping forward.

We watched CNN Town Hall Meeting with Joe Biden. He was well prepared, articulate and responded well to the viewer questions which were skyped to him and Anderson Cooper. He was moved when speaking about those who have had to die alone. Mayor Garcetti of LA was interviewed in the following hour by Chris Cuomo. Cuomo has been doing an excellent job...very intense & precise. Garcetti was articulate and empathetic. Both men are photogenic to say the least. Anderson looks frightened.

I had planned to sing-along with Jerry and try to get a delivery shopping slot, but I could feel my tension level & blood pressure rising so I finished reading Lady's Man on the Kindle. It was ridiculous and very funny.

Sent a check to Maria for March. Texted Geri in answer to her questions. Steffi called after dinner. We are going to try Zoom a family Seder on Pesach.

Sunday, March 30

Tried to place an order on Shop-Rite at midnight last night. Somehow or other my reservation never registered.

I find this very frustrating. We had a quasi Pu Pu platter last night for dinner. Watched part one of Unorthodox on NetFlix.

Sharon & Clive called early this morning and shopped for us and brought it down. It was really a wonderful surprise. We did find a box of gloves in the garage closet and even ordered face maska on

Amazon. There is now a voluntary order requesting that we not travel out of the state. The shelter in place is strongly underlined.

Day 10, Monday, March 31

The news is horrifying. Videos of refrigerator trucks loaded with black body bags outside of hospitals

are gut-wrenching. The constant pleas from mayors, governors, and families of those suffering fill the airwaves. And yet the president offers no understanding of what's actually happening. Dr Fauci & Dr Birxi apparently convinced him that lifting shelter in place /social distancing could lead to over 1.000,000 deaths. Best case scenario, 100,000-200,000

deaths. Restrictions are in place for at least another month. Yet, Trump goes on Fox and Twitter and spins nasty comments about political opponents. So discouraging. The media is presenting interesting presentation using Skype and linking us to those on the front lines.

Imagine the Javits Center jammed with beds, a tent hospital set up in Central Park, And yet, thank goodness, we feel sheltered in our bubble wrap of a community. I hope our long-term planning has protected us so far. But t think that a little more than a month ago as this was gearing up,

we were on a ship with 2500 people and lived in hotels the entire month of February. We haven't been out of the community for over a week except for a sub run. If it clears up later, we'll walk the circle.

Looking forward to our BNC Hot Topics Zoom meeting to see if I can pull it off. The meeting was a great success and fun, too. We scheduled for next Monday again. Quiet day otherwise. Laundry again, of course. Texted with Maria. She received our check.

Dear Residents:

This email is being sent in response to calls and an email requesting information on the virus in the community. Our Association counsel, who has advised that we will not identify any diagnosed individuals to protect their privacy. Any disclosures that are necessary to protect the public will be left in the hands of public health officials. Further, this information would not help you protect yourself because testing in New Jersey is only available to individuals who are experiencing symptoms of respiratory illness. The public health recommendations for self-protection remain exactly the same whether or not certain individuals in the community may have contracted the virus.

The reason this notification is being sent to the community is to emphasize the necessity and importance of adhering to the recommendations of the CCD and the Government.

Day 11, Tuesday March 31.

The last day of March. We have been in this house in self-isolation since @ March 10. We returned from our drive home from south Florida March 4, including an overnight at Jay & Diana's. We realize that we are so lucky that we avoided the coronavirus epidemic while we were away. I cannot imagine being stranded away from home at this time. Nancy Pelosi is being interviewed on Morning Joe. She is magnificent, speaking clearly, frankly and affirmatively. .Gov Cuomo was on with Lawrence O'Donnell last night. They were both moved as they signed off.

Spoke to Dave at length last night. It is tough being stranded in his home with so many memories popping up unbidden. Fortunately, he enjoys cooking and spends time preparing meals. Go know he would be the one inheriting Mom's culinary skills.

Finished a foolish Sophie Kinsella novel, joining the list of books I read and forget rapidly..Today I will carve out time of which I have an excess, to take the AARP driving course. Never happened. Maybe tomorrow.

We are staggered by the loss of life and widespread infection, and this morning retailers furloughed hundreds of thousands workers. This means they are eligible for unemployment and right now their benefits stay in place. I fear that the economy will never recover fro this.

Stephanie Ruhl is on right now talking about the difficulty about actually getting money that will help pay the April 1 bills. Furthermore, she pointed out that the president does not support any oversight on the \$50 billion dollars business fund.

Day 12, Wednesday, April 1 April Fool's Day

The President's Daily Press Conference was more solemn than before. He laid out the terrible two weeks before us. The number of predicted virus infections & deaths has reached a dreadful level. It is predicted that projections indicate a possible 100-200,000 deaths and possibly more in the next few months. Some states seem to have flattened the curve-California & Washington instituted early stay at home orders. There is a battleship which has an outbreak and Holland America's Xandam & other cruise ship are searching for berths to dock with sick passengers and 4 corpses aboard. Gov DeSantis is very reluctant to issue a statewide stay in place order. The President still resists centralized distribution of materials -ventilators and PPE. Joe Biden was on with Brian Williams, but the Democrats are eclipsed by these daily press conferences. And the President and McConnell have decided to blame their lack of attention early on to the corona crisis to the time consuming Impeachment trial.

We are now advised to have face covers when we go outside.. Chris Cuomo moderated his show from his basement where here is self-isolated. Has the virus.

So, we're staying home, which can be dangerous itself. Jerry tripped over a floor mat in the garage yesterday afternoon. He had difficulty getting up ad didn't call for me. Fortunately, he pulled himself up and only scraped his knee. I tripped off the top step the other day without injury. But we both have to be very cognizant from this point onward. I threw the mats away. We watched an one hour lecture sponsored by Brandeis University on the history of Yiddish culture in Israel. Interesting! She pointed out that the haredi use of Yiddish in Israel does not apply to Yiddish culture as they consider literature & theater frivolous.

I see the sun out the window. First time in days.Lots of e-mailing yesterday. Set up an Encore Book Club vis-a-vis Zoom for this evening.

Diana is going to set up one today or tomorrow. Oh, we are tech geniuses!

Day 14: Thursday, April 2

Book Club was a great success last night. Then Jerry & I watched Tiger King on Netflix. Weird documentary about the strange personalities who inhabit the world of trading in exotic big cats. Like carnies almost who gather groups of the lost around them . Murder, mayhem & mystery, indeed.

It's fun getting together on Zoom, but I think I will start calling again. But I am looking forward the zoom meeting with the family this afternoon.

Short entry today. I completed the AARP Driving Course. Dropped off the contribution to the community "chipp in" for the First Responders and walked the circle. Family Zoom was fun. We are going to do in Thursday at 5 for the time being!

Day 14. Friday, April 3

It's almost 3 PM. Much later in the day than I usually post. I actually got dressed and washed my hair today. Looks good.

Spoke to Marylynn last night and she said the Z-pak was helping her bronchitis. The medication being touted for the virus is her long-term lupus stalwart. She's worried she won't be able to get it. We had great success with Pop's Farm Market digital ordering. Just one little glitch. I ordered 1 lemon & 1 lime. I got 11 limes...everything else was perfect. The bread & the donuts was delicious. Looking forward to the giant cookies & the blueberry pound cake! Fruit and veggies look great, too.

Took forever to clean the fruits and vegetables .I think I wore gloves for 3 hours! The virus is spreading rapidly. The NYT did a four page spread on Paterson. There were also mind boggling graphics on the changing distances traveled in the states and the equally mind-boggling unemployment figures. The government has been inefficient and woefully slow in protecting the supply chain and feeding the unemployed. I am very worried as are we all. The Holland American ships docked in Fort Lauderdale, but not everyone disembarked.

The Zoom meetings proliferate. Sherry & Elliot invited us to their seder on Wed at 6.

Don't know what time the kids are planning ours. The Temple is doing one the second night and we have Hot Topics Zoom on Monday and Chauverim Zoom the first Sunday in May.

Sent a contribution to the Central Jersey Food Bank and a condolence card to Gayle Halbfish. It is sad enough, to lose Murray, but not to have the comfort of visitors is really tragic. Have a call scheduled with Gabby tomorrow, She's so busy working herself to a frenzy listening to political calls, finding jokes, forwarding anti-Trump articles.

Lila posted an adorable little video on Facebook.

Day 15, Saturday April 4

9:30 AM: Just had a shocking phone call. Lou died suddenly. of a massive heart attack. The shock and the logistics in the middle of all of this are overwhelming.

Made a really good chicken dish for dinner last night, using the thin sliced chicken breasts Sharon bought last Sunday. The produce we picked up at Pop's yesterday is terrific...so many veggies for the salad and wonderful baked goods. Still haven't heard from the kids about the seder get together on Wednesday. The calendar is filling up with Zoom dates.

Am going to sign up for lectures online Monday afternoons at 1. Carol A is a fount of info.Great news from Shirley Santos- Encore is virus free! Lecture series is sold out.

Watched a little of Jimmy Fallon broadcasting from his home. His kids are really funny. Not much on the to do list today. Tomorrow night we light the yartzeit candle for Mom & Jack. So odd it is the same date.

Day 16, Sunday April 5

Presidential announcement that the next week will be the worst. The township sent out a list of local restaurants who deliver- on their website. Had another good dinner last night-Jerry grilled steak. Two for two.

Yesterday was a day of lots of phone time. The shock of Lou Friedlander's sudden death reverberates. The impact on funerals & shiva is so devastating. Jerry spoke to Bruce, Len and Shelley. I spoke to Sheila, Geri, Doris, Gabriela & David. Messaged Jay Lurie & Sy Marsh. We watched Netflix documentaries together last night: short gems on Luna a maximarathon champ, runs in sandals and a traditional Chihuahua skirt, the making of Unorthodox, the first mini-series partially in Yiddish, and a beautiful video essay on foods of China.

Lit a yartzeit candle for Mom & Jack.

It occurred to me that I have changed my morning pattern to adjust to the virus. I shower every other morning and take my pills before I pick up the paper...then, of course wash my hands again. Doing the laundry much more often. Just watched another advisory on disinfecting the house. Especially shoes and outerwear. Glad we've been so vigilant about staying inside. Each Walmart store is allowing a maximum of 5 people per 1000 feet. Social distancing marked out for those in line. One way aisles. The lines outside of stores seem daunting. Heard that the line out of Trader Joe's in South Brunswick on Route 1 was out to the highway!

Just tried to get on the Shop-Rite site on on-line ordering. There is a 10 minute wait.

Checked last time we were in a market was March 21.

Day 16: Monday, April 6

Somehow filled the 2 hours until I sat down. Time disappears, I followed some tips for Zoom broadcasting-elevating laptop-fixing hair and putting on make-up.

The Farm Stand is totally overwhelmed. Hope they'll be caught up later this week. The fresh produce has been wonderful but as they say-"the stockpile is twindling."

Lou's funeral will be on zoom. We are not going to view.

Sharon & Steffi have scheduled the seder for Wed at 6. They sent a haggadah photo so we can all be on the same page. Should be fun. Went on a mad search for our Passover ritual stuff. I must have gifted it to someone. I don't know what we'll eat for a seder meal.

Watched PBS last night for several hours. Something about fictionalized shiny war stories doesn't sit right with me, but I'm sure I'll watch it often & keep up with the running plts.

Masks are on the way...from China. I keep thinking that when they come in I'll venture into a store & try to get toilet paper, paper towels **and** beef and/or fish for entrees.

Seem to be changing batteries on remotes and the key board!

Nixle injected a bit of humor into yesterday into the daily up-date. The cops are on the lookout for a thief who is stealing thousands of egges. Has white fluffy ears!

Am slowly wending my way through Witch Elm by Tana Frenchl now turn TV off at 11 and read. It helps Jerry sleep better to have the room quiet..
We have scheduled a Zoom Hot Topics later this AM.

Day 17: Tuesday, April 7

Hot Topics went well yesterday, even tho I forgot to turn on sound at the beginning. They could hear me but I couldn't hear them for the first few minutes. Good news this AM. Sherry's got another great nephew. Mazel Tov to the Schleins!

Didn't sleep well. Finished Witch Elm by Tana French. Psychological twists and turns.

Today is the Wisconsin Primary. I am beyond furious with the Supreme Court, refusing to uphold the Governor's mandate to extend the mail in voting by few days so that citizens don't have to risk their lives to vote. There are long lines of masked voters waiting in lines in masks to cast their ballots. Meanwhile, the acting assist Navy secretary resigned after his insulting speech to the sailors on the USS Roosevelt, the Inspector General who was to monitor the 2 trillion dollar Congressional Rescue program was fired, & there is a change in the White House press office. What a disaster this president has been!

We did a dress rehearsal for tomorrow's Berke seder. It was fun.

Spoke to Judy G, Marylynn & Dave. Cleaned & vacuumed (together!)

Day 18: Wednesday April 8 Passover 2020

Some encouraging news. Sounds like the curve on the virus may be flattening in this area. The African-American community is really hard hit by this, reflective of the poor healthcare in their community. Talk of anti-body testing to see who is virus free and/or immune because they have indications they have had it.

Governor Murphy extended the social distancing order for 30 days and closed the parks. Watched the new David Burns doc on Genes. Really well-done...then skimmed a bit of Rachel & Cuomo. Chris is battling the virus and conducting his nightly show. It was so strange to have a primary night with no coverage...and the relatively few voters staying in line separated by 6 feet. The British PM, Boris Johnson is in the ICU on oxygen. Still the nightly press briefings continue with Trump pivoting on his position daily & blithely firing anyone who is in place to be a watchdog! He's still pushing hydroxychloriquin (anit-malarial drug.)

The take-out worked out well. First of all, it was really a delicious treat. Veal parm, soup & pasta. We had it delivered. Emptied box, took items into laundry room, sprayed packages

with Lysol-not on food. Put food in microwave dishes and nuked them & brought soup to a boil before serving. The offer was two parm dishes for \$20. We put the second serving in the freezer. A good experience.

Lots of email activity with clever parodies and/or outraged political statements.

Going to figure out a meal for Passover,,,think I do have ingredients for haroseth, So we can have some semblance of a seder plate with matzo, celery & horseradish.It should be great to see everyone tonight- on video!

Robert showed up. Fertilizer is in place for the bushes! Saw t he first ant in the house.. Hope whatever what the exterminator sprays next week keeps them under control.

Chaos, communication, confusion & corruption is a danger sign for trouble ahead says Mika Kozynski on Morning Joe

Doing a zoom with Dave & Diana et al tomorrow. Strange conversation with Dave yesterday. He is too isolated & depressed. And feeling he shouldn't impose on Emma & Ally & justifying those who are anti-PC.

Received March Fidelity Statement. Down under 10%. Jerry thought it would be more.

Day 19: Thursday April 9

Well, we donned the masks (bandanna & scarf) and ventured to Walmart. Jerry looked like a bandit. I was Mata Hari. My scarf kept slipping when it wasn't suffocating me

The store website indicated that there was TP in stock. There wasn't but there was paper towels & kleenex. Also picked up onions, oranges, bananas, butter, cream cheese & dw detergent. Have to plot a way to get protein/entrees into this house. Store was relatively empty-both of customers & stock. So we think there was not much risk.

Powered up @ 4 PM to make haroseth and a kugel for our faux seder. Lots of peeling & chapping & I only used 3 apples, a few boards of matzo & almonds/, walnuts/raisins! Seder itself was wonderful-no Justin, Julian or Felicia. Alexa had to work late, finishing projects before she goes on furlough. Clive did an amazing job. It was short & sweet. Everyone looked great. It was Clive & Sharon, Steffi, Gary & Alyssa, Lauren& Ellie, Courtney & Dani, Arlene & Arnie, Scott's daughter & her boyfriend(so adorable) and Mike and Sheila.

On the news front-another event filled day. Bernie dropped out of the race, pledged support to Biden, but wants a voice in shaping the platform, so will let his name remain on the ballot on the remaining primaries. His impact has been stunning. The in-coming virus cases seem to be declining-so social distancing is beginning to have an impact; however, the deaths are rising and the total number is the worst ever. Some speculation that the huge impact on NYC & the state is due to the refusal to cut off immigration from Europe in February & March.

Sherry & Elliot self-isolated when they returned from Italy, but I wonder how many others on their plane or all the planes which landed at JFK that day alone did the same.

The President is eyeing May 1 as a day to get the country back to work. We'll see. Fox is blasting that it is ridiculous to keep healthy workers home and the rising unemployment figures are disastrous. Trump also maintains it is impossible to test the antibodies of all Americans. Meanwhile, Americans continue to plan interesting ways to entertain themselves and Zoom use has increased one hundred fold.

Speaking of Zoom, Diana, Dave, Emma & Ally chatted with us yesterday afternoon. The girls look gorgeous. My thick white part....is getting wider! Seems as though Richard's business is open and they are not keeping their distances. Interesting..Candy's cat apparently took a two week walk about. Home now!

Started The World That We Knew by Allce Hoffman, our May Book Club book. I think this title probably describes our lives before Feb, 2020. The novel starts with the creation of a golem to protect a young Jewish girl escape from sure extinction by the Nazis. WE need that golem right now.

Wild short storm yesterday afternoon. Strong winds, hailstones amidst the falling blossoms. Then the electric failed for two hours-the wind knocked over a tree & brought down a line. But the generator kept us going, cable & all!

Made a delicious matzo fritatta for dinner. Escaped to Midsommer Mysteries and Gray's Anatomy.

What a wonderful picturesque setting for picaresque murder mystery based on a mural in the crypt of an old church. We had homosexual awakening, an ambitious female cleric, a rising river with bobbing boats and more-all in 90 minutes! Oh, on Gray- Richard does not have Alzheimers after all. Needed a gory hip replacement During a surgery, one of the doctors receives a phone call from his bride to be which is a butt call of his love having sex with his main romantic rival, just hours before the wedding..

Cuomo continues to be a great communicator. He pointed out that while there are fewer new cases the death rate continues to rise. The question -how can this country carry on emotionally & economically

Nothing is pre-chartered here. It all depends on what we do. Function of what we do and how we do it,

Day 21: Saturday, April 11

I am going to figure out how to watch You Tube on the bigger screens. Every time I started to stream TV someone called, but if using On Demand you can turn right back on without restarting the site.

Not much today-domestic stuff. Find we are changing sheets and doing laundry more often. The masks did not arrive as promised. I think we will go to a supermarket(in scarves & gloves) to get some meat & fish. We made tacos for dinner last night, crab c akes tonight. Didn't feel like make calls, but I guess we'll resume outreach this week-end. Lots of phone calls today. Set up Zoom for Wed @ 6PM for Sherry's Birthday. Wish we lived closer to Dave. He's lonely!

Day 22: Sunday. April 12....Easter Sunday

It's 11 AM. Slow start to the day. Here's a first-let my hair dry naturally rather than blow it out. Looks about the same – not great. Am reading three books at once...two on the Kindle, one hard-back library book, borrowed from Arlene, which I want to complete & return to her early next week. Each is so different that I can keep track easily. Am going to try to visit some art museums online today. I am not unhappy or particularly bored, If it wasn't Easter Sunday, we could attempt food shopping as the refrigerator is echoing. The plan is to go Tuesday, giving them time to stock up following the week-end. The masks, promised Friday, are somewhere in the supply chain...or not. Refund is an offered option now. Sharon called. Good conversation...

Walked the circle. Several walkers. Some in groups...one large high spirited one @10 wearing improvised Easter Bonnets...rabbit ears, decorated straw hats. Good to grab fun as you can!

Day 23: Monday, April 13

Neither of the Amazon orders (masks TP) is going to materialize. We are in the middle of a strong storm which is predicted to last all day with high winds. There is a decrease in the number of new hospitalizations. But the hospitals are still overwhelmed as the virus requires lengthy stays. The impact on healthcare workers has been immense. Social distancing has worked, as has the dedication of those working to keep us safe, fed, with utilities running and children educated. But the vast distances in American society & economy has proved deadly. There is nation-wide cabin fever. And we have it too.

Great debate on when it is prudent to "open the country up."

So yesterday, spoke to David who was busy cleaning the garage. He found Diana's Cabbage Patch dolls which he posed with Cleo in a cute text. I read, watched NetFlix and PBS BBC gems. Jerry is transfixed by the Science Channel. We played a close game of Scrabble after dinner- cauliflower crust pizza. Tasty!

Day 24: Tuesday, April 14

Wisconsin Primary results finally in. Biden won handily, and the count revealed a 100,000 margin in favor of the Democratic candidate for a seat in the state Supreme Court. This after the State Supreme Court and the US Supreme Court overturned the Democratic Governor's attempt to postpone the primary until after the pandemic. Joe S calls Trump toxic.

Long, crazy press conference lasting hours yesterday.

The storm raged all day with winds & downpours. Little Daisy Court impact, but Route 18 flooded near Cranbury Road. WE stayed in and did our own thing. Finished "American Dirt", binged Netflix Welsh series. "Each had promising beginnings but failed to hold my interest half-way thru.

Jerry made 2 fabulous Cosmos for me, but they attacked me as the evening went on. Didn't do anything substantive yesterday or today.

NYT: Headline: NJ Testing is in Chaos. We have to go shopping, We've played Sequence two nights in

a row. Chatting with Dave almost every day.

Listening to various reports has made me really anxious. It is like the days of horror during the Viet Nam war. Videos of corpses piled up in hospitals freezer storerooms, people getting the virus a second time, Latinos & African Americans dyeing at a much greater rate than the populace at large. I wonder that we will ever get out of this mess. We constructed masks out of cloth/paper & rubber bands.

Day 25: Wednesday, April 15

Shopping success this morning. Put on our masks & gloves and went to Stop & Shop, where they were distributing masks. Store was relatively empty. We thanked the cashier. The store is marked with one way aisles and six foot marks to wait in line. The cashiers are wearing gloves and there is a Lucite shield between the shoppers & the cashier.

We were able to buy TP & paper towels. No napkins, but the towels will suffice. Stocked OJ & milk and other items which should carry us for a few weeks., especially chicken breast & chopped turkey.

It is exhausting, Wearing masks & gloves, emptying the groceries in the garage, spraying every item and spraying with Lysol. Then washing most things. Using Purell numerous times, washing hands & this & that. Spraying g coats & shoes and keeping them in the laundry room & garage, The masks are suffocating. Sent an email (shopping lists) to the farmers' market, but have not heard back yet. We'll see. Still have to pick up a Rx & do a liquor run. Our Amazon orders of masks and TP have not arrived. Ordered a few things (@\$200 worth) from Costco, but it is not possible to get delivery from their food department. Sure sign of spring-the sound of the lawnmowers!

Had a wonderful dream last night where we were all dressed up on a glamorous cruise ship surrounded by friends laughing and having a wonderful time....in his dream, Jerry was working on WHN & got lost trying to get back to the studio. Interesting comparison of attitudes!

Have a Zoom Birthday Happy Hour scheduled with Sherry & Elliot. Bought a festive cupcake and have the Prosecco on ice. It will be great fun! Bought a Stop & Shop store roasted chicken for dinner.

Watching AOC & Dr. Birks, distanced guests on The View as I finish this lengthy entree. Impressive women. Stock Market took back more than it gained yesterday..... Long cozy chat with Irene.

There is a protest in Detroit against the stay at home ruling by Michigan's governor. Young men waving flags w/o masks walking disregarding the 6 foot guidelines & driving through the streets. Follow-up tomorrow. The COVD numbers are moderating in NY, but the overall stats are horrifying. They are adjusting the total number of fatalities by adding those deaths of people who were not tested but in all probability died of the virus. Bodies are being buried unidentified in the former Potters Field. Some places such as nursing homes are death traps.

Day 26: Thursday. April 16, 2020

Joe Biden was impressive this morning on Morning Joe. The pandemic & economic situation is dire.

Mitch McConnell refuses to move on a further domestic aid bill. He and the President are honing in on getting more big business assistance and ratifying even more judges. The right wing protesters and the President want to "open the country." We all want to open the country, but containing this virus is paramount. The search for a vaccine is high priority,

Pop's Farm filled my order. The pantry is now well stocked, and Jerry has calmed down. Our Zoom cocktail hour with Sherry & Elliot was great fun. Gov Cuomo is very present. He was on with his brother last night. What a terrific relationship. But watching MSNBC & CNN last night made me too anxious. I escaped into Iceland-The Valhalla Mystery – dark & fascinating.

Bev Haber's sister died not the virus in Florida. Particularly poignant in this era of self-isolation

Family zoomed at 5. Fun, Kids are bored.

Day 27: Friday. April 17, 2020

The front page is frightening. The economic situation is frightening. Surely the government can structure a safety net. Day 41: Monday, May 11

Hot Topics scheduled for 11 AM. Did the meeting-an hour 10 minutes. Shopped at McCafferty's

Beautiful selection. Rest of day flew by. Very tired & achy. Watched TV together, Somehow the news seems even more intense. Going to try to avoid it for awhile. Dotty died of COV-d very suddenly-Irene's vivacious 85 year old bowling buddy-Jerry had bowled with her too. Fidelity statement improving..One month until my 79th birthday.

Day 42: Tuesday, May 12 -Sunny cool day

Long term facilities are inundated with deaths from the virus. So frightening. Devastating, More than ½ the deaths in NJ were in long term facilities. Even stranger Prez news conference yesterday-walking out rudelyon female reporters, one markedly id'd as Chinese-

18 ADDITIONAL REPORTED DEATHS: 14 IN LONG-TERM CARE FACILITIES AND 4 COMMUNITY-WIDE

Sadly, we must report that Middlesex County has informed us of 18 additional deaths in our community. Over the past week, Middlesex County completed a comprehensive reconciliation of confirmed deaths in the State of New Jersey's Communicable Diseases Database to ensure the County and State death lists were accurately aligned.

These additional deaths are being reported through May 7, 2020. A further breakdown of this data reflects that 76% of these deaths occur in long term care facilities and 24% are community wide. 85 deaths in Monroe Township: 65 in long term long term facilities.(total)

"Every one of these deaths are a blow to us as a community. We sympathize with the families and mourn the loss with them," said Mayor Gerald W. Tamburro. "It is important that we stand together in support our friends and neighbors, during this most difficult time."
